Live Fire Training

Training will consist of a short AM classroom session covering basic principles of firefighter safety, SCBA and fire streams. The remainder of the AM and all afternoon will be spent doing hands on training with Live Fire. Participants will put their knowledge and skills to use in the two-story Mobile Live Fire Training Unit. This hands on training will simulate conditions encountered in actual interior structure fires (live fire, heat, humidity and smoke). During the evolutions the student will be able to practice SCBA usage, emergency SCBA procedures, hose handling, nozzle techniques, fire attack, ventilation and more. Students will have the opportunity to practice multiple fire attack scenarios including ground level entry and basement fires as well as rescue procedures. Any students needing to fulfill the 'Live Fire Training' portion of their SD FF Certification Card should bring it to class. If all pre-requisites are met the applicable hands on tasks on the Certification card will be signed.

Prerequisites: Participants must be 18 years of age, in good health and a SD Certified FF or currently enrolled in a SD Certified FF course having received training to meet the minimum job performance requirements for Fire Fighter 1 in NFPA 1001, related to the following subjects; SAFETY, FIRE BEHAVIOR, PORTABLE EXTINGUISHERS, PPE, LADDERS, FIRE HOSE, APPLIANCES, STREAMS, OVERHAUL, WATER SUPPLY, VENTILATION, FORCIBLE ENTRY & BUILDING CONSTRUCTION. Participants will be required to read and sign a SAFETY GUIDELINE DOCUMENT as well as a LIABILITY WAIVER DOCUMENT that also indicates they meet the minimum participation requirements.

Vehicle Extrication

This course provides interactive lecture/hands-on training for fire and rescue personnel in size-up, stabilization, hazard control, patient access, and disentanglement at automobile crashes. Emphasis is placed on proper choice, placement and use of equipment available locally. All are employed to think outside the box and complete an extrication with hydraulic tools using the jaws, shears, and rams, along with air bags and cribbing for stabilization. Protective Clothing Required --Participants must furnish approved helmet, fire boots or leather safety boots, eye protection, gloves, coveralls or turnout gear for class

Fire Reporting, IQS, Ross,

This class is to help with understanding of what IQS is and how to it can be set up and used within your department as a record keeping program. You will also learn on how to status your resources in ROSS and how to keep them up to date. The fire reporting portion of the class will help with the operating procedures, and what information is needed to complete a fire report.

So you think you're the Chief?

This is an interactive class for chiefs and department/company officers on duties, problems and other issues that you may face as chief officers in fire departments today.

Aftermath of a Disaster “the first Four Hours”

This class is designed to introduce fire departments and local governments with understanding the processes for a response following a disaster event. Students will learn the steps needed to complete a community risk assessment, development of a pre-incident plan, and command and control following an event that impacts your protection area. An understanding of the processes that are needed for Disaster Declarations at the County, State, and Federal level will help with securing resources that are needed to control the incident. At the completion of the class students will have a better understanding of how damage assessments affect our declaration process as well as how they are used to prioritize our response.
